

## Adult Cancers vs. Childhood Cancers

<b>Most Common Adult Cancers</b> (children do not get these cancers except in the extremely rare case of lung cancer)	<b>Most Common Childhood Cancers</b>	<b>Types of Childhood Cancers</b>
<b>Lung</b>	<b>Leukemia</b>	<b>Leukemia (Blood Cancers)</b> <b>ALL:</b> 80% <b>AML:</b> 20% The opposite is true for adults (they get AML more often)
<b>Breast</b>	<b>Brain</b>	<b>Central Nervous System</b> <b>Brain:</b> gliomas & medulloblastomas <b>Spine</b>
<b>Prostate</b>	<b>Solid Tumor</b>	<b>Osteogenic Sarcoma:</b> In the Bone <b>Ewing's Sarcoma:</b> In Bone Marrow <b>Neuroblastoma:</b> Outside the brain <b>Wilms' Tumor:</b> Kidney <b>Rhabdomyosarcoma:</b> Muscle/Soft Tissue
<b>Colon</b>	<b>Lymphoma</b>	<b>Lymphoma:</b> Non-Hodgkin's Hodgkin's

*Also when children and adults have the same blood cancers the protocol treatment is completely different because of age and development.*
